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1 Introduction and purpose


Welcome to the 2018 District Data Pack for South Staffordshire.

This Data Pack helps to identify priorities at district and ward level to support targeting and in particular should be used alongside the data within the **Early Help Framework** to support place-based working. It provides a robust intelligence base across a wide range of indicators which cover the three priority outcomes for Staffordshire:

- be able to access more good jobs and feel the benefits of economic growth;
- be healthier and more independent;
- feel safer, happier and more supported in and by their community.

To make a real difference and to reduce inequalities we need to target our efforts towards those residents, families and communities who experience the greatest levels of inequality and who demonstrate the highest levels of vulnerability. This Data Pack helps to identify these communities and provides evidence to support the development of more focussed placebased strategies.

In addition to the Early Help Framework this Data Pack should be used alongside other resources such as the Community Safety Assessments and Joint Strategic Needs Assessments and local intelligence and knowledge. Used together, these will create an enriched picture of residents, their families and their communities to underpin more effective evidence-based commissioning and support.

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2 Key points

2.1 The population of South Staffordshire

- South Staffordshire is resident to 111,900 people. The population has a lower proportion of people aged under five, under 16 and aged 16-64 compared to England. There are however more people aged 65 and over in South Staffordshire compared to average.
- The overall population of South Staffordshire is projected to increase between 2017 and 2027 by 3% with a significant growth in people aged 65 and over (19%) and aged 85 and over (47%). The rate of increase in the number of older people in South Staffordshire is faster than the England average and equates to 1,600 additional residents aged 85 and over by 2027.
- 1% of South Staffordshire residents (1,500 people) live within the most deprived national quintile.
- The dependency ratio for older people in South Staffordshire is 40 older people for every 100 people of working age which is higher than England.
- 2.2 Be able to access more good jobs and feel the benefits of economic growth
 - The proportion of children in South Staffordshire who reach a good level of development at the age of five (78%) is better than the national average (71%).

- GCSE attainment¹ for South Staffordshire pupils is similar to the England average. There are however inequalities within the district with attainment ranging from 11% in Perton Dippons ward to 71% in Pathingham and Patshull ward.
- South Staffordshire has a higher than average proportion of children who are absent or excluded from school.
- The percentage of adults aged 16-64 with NVQ level 3² or above is lower than the national average. There is also a higher number of adults with no qualifications compared to average.
- Unemployment and youth unemployment rates in South
 Staffordshire (as at May 2018) are lower than the national average.
- The gap in the employment rate between those with a long-term health condition and the general population is 38%, higher than the national average (29%). Other vulnerable groups (for example those with mental health conditions or who have a learning disability) have relatively low employment rates.
- Around 22% (23,600) of the population in South Staffordshire are estimated to be financially stressed, i.e. find it difficult or very difficult to cope on their current income. This is lower than the national average (28%).
- The proportion of older people in South Staffordshire who are aged 60 and over living in income deprived households is significantly better than the national average.

- Housing affordability is an issue in South Staffordshire. The average house price (£212,250) now stands at 7.0 times the average gross salary (£30,329).
- The level of broadband connectivity in South Staffordshire is below the 95% target, worse than national average.

2.3 Be healthier and more independent

- Overall life expectancy at birth in South Staffordshire is 81 years for men and 84 years for women, both higher than the national averages. However both men and women living in the most deprived areas of South Staffordshire live five and six years less than those living in less deprived areas.
- Healthy life expectancy in South Staffordshire is 66 years for both men and women with both higher than average. Women in South Staffordshire spend more of their lives in poor health than men (18 years compared to 15).
- Around 25% of children aged four to five in South Staffordshire have excess weight (overweight or obese) with rates being higher than average. Around 35% of children aged 10-11 have excess weight.
- Teenage pregnancy rates in South Staffordshire are higher than England.
- During 2016/17 around 110 children under 15 were admitted to hospital for unintentional and deliberate injuries, with rates similar to England.
- The rate of hospital admissions caused alcohol is higher than the England average.
- Around six out of ten adults have excess weight (either obese or overweight) which is similar to the national average. The

- proportion of people who are obese in South Staffordshire is also similar to the England average.
- Two out of ten South Staffordshire adults are physically inactive, similar to the England average (equating to around 21,700 people). Around four out of ten South Staffordshire adults aren't eating the recommended five portions of fruit and vegetables per day.
- The number of people on dementia, diabetes and hypertension registers in South Staffordshire is higher than the national averages although this could reflect good case finding, diagnosis and recording. However, there is a higher proportion of residents in South Staffordshire with a limiting long-term illness compared to the national average. Disability claimants are also high which would suggest levels of long term conditions are high.
- Emergency hospital admissions are lower than the national average. The number of South Staffordshire residents who die early from causes considered preventable is also lower than the national average.
- The proportion of older people in South Staffordshire who take up their offer of a seasonal flu vaccine or their offer of a pneumococcal vaccine is lower than average.

2.4 Feel safer, happier and more supported

- Data from 'Feeling the Difference' suggests that 96% South Staffordshire respondents were satisfied with the area as a place to live.
- The rate of children in need is lower than the Staffordshire average.
- South Staffordshire has a higher proportion of lone pensioner households compared to the national average.

- More residents in South Staffordshire provide unpaid care compared to the England average. This equates to around 13,500 people. In particular, 15% (3,400 people) of residents aged 65 and over provide unpaid care which is higher than the England average of 14%.
- One in ten South Staffordshire households are living in fuel poverty.
 This is better than the national average.
- Based on Feeling the Difference Survey, nearly four times as many people are fearful of being a victim of crime (11%) compared with those who have actually experienced crime (3%) in South Staffordshire.
- Overall rates of crime, alcohol-related crime, anti-social behaviour, domestic abuse, sexual offences and violent crime in South Staffordshire are all lower than the national averages.

2.5 Supporting Place Based Approach (PBA)

The aim of PBA in Staffordshire is to make best use of public sector and community assets to:

- Reduce demand to higher tier services,
- Improve outcomes for children, families and communities by providing support as early as possible,
- Build resilience and encourage independence within communities and provide high quality statutory services when required.

The ward indicator matrix shows that it is often the more deprived areas experiencing poorer outcomes. For us to achieve better outcomes for the residents of South Staffordshire, particularly within the current financial climate, we need to target our efforts towards those who experience the greatest levels of inequality and who demonstrate the highest levels of vulnerability. The table below highlights wards which have the highest levels of need based on an assessment of key indicators:

3 District level indicator matrix

The information in the following matrix is mainly benchmarked against England and colour coded using a similar approach to that used in the <u>Public Health Outcomes Framework tool</u>. It is important to remember that even if an indicator is categorised as being 'better than England' it may still indicate an important problem, for example rates of childhood obesity are already high across England so even if an area does not have a significantly high rate it could still mean that it is an important issue locally and should be considered alongside local knowledge.
